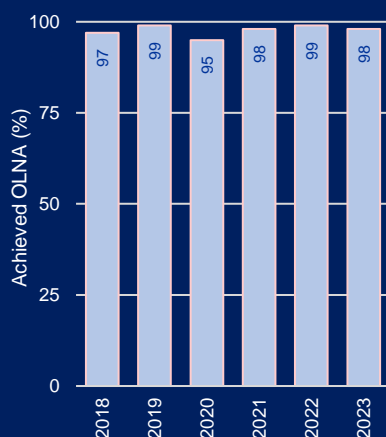

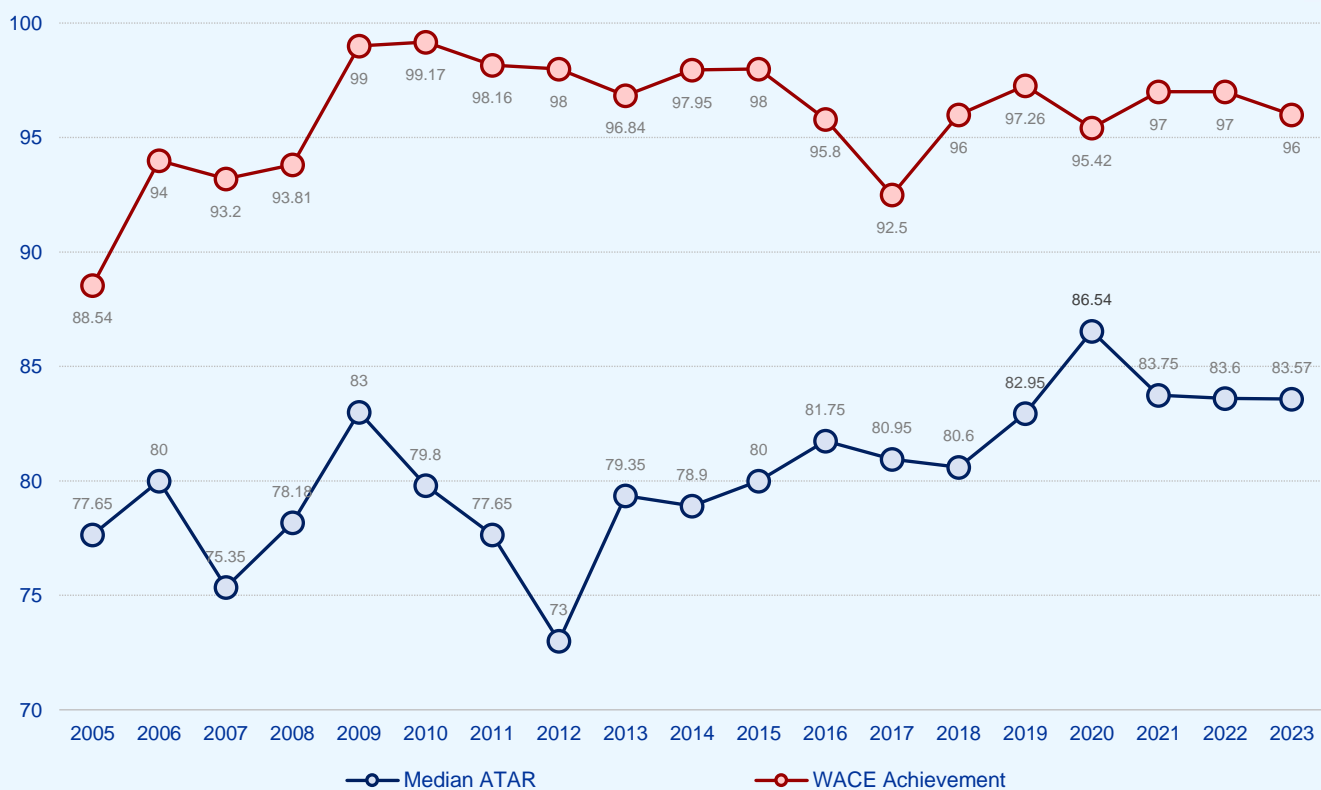

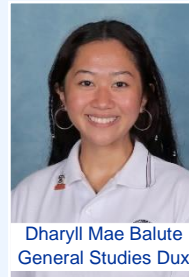

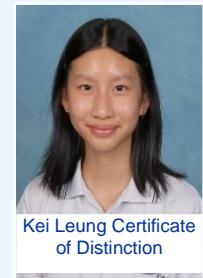

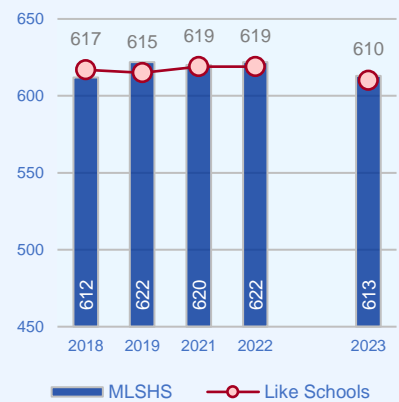

YEAR 7 READING

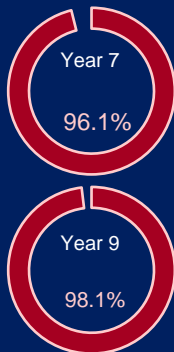


YEAR 9 READING



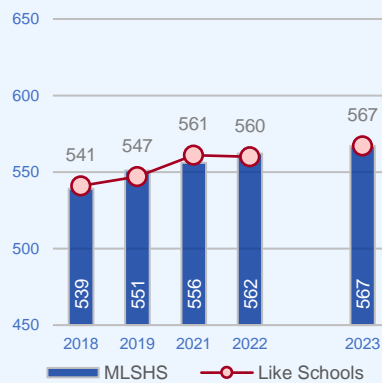

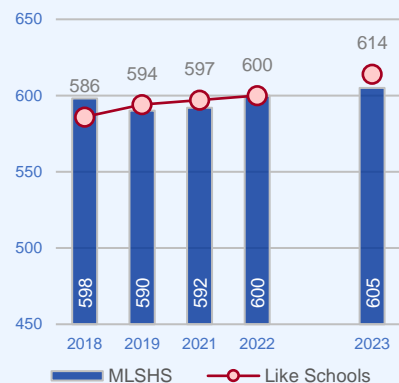

YEAR 7 WRITING

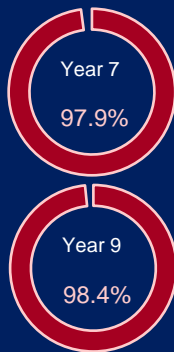


YEAR 9 WRITING



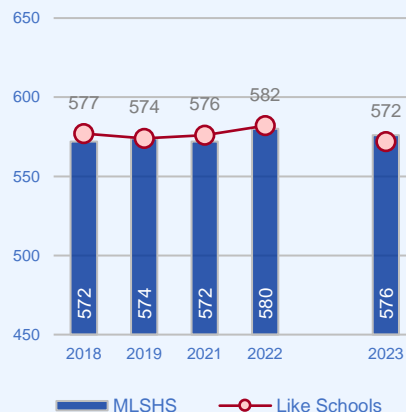

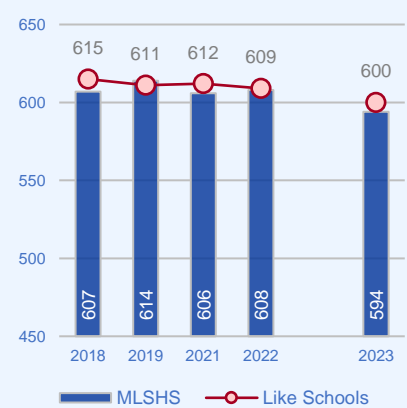

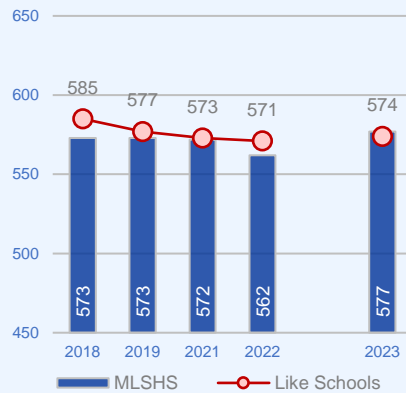

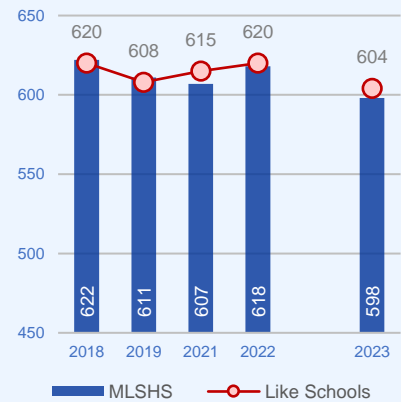

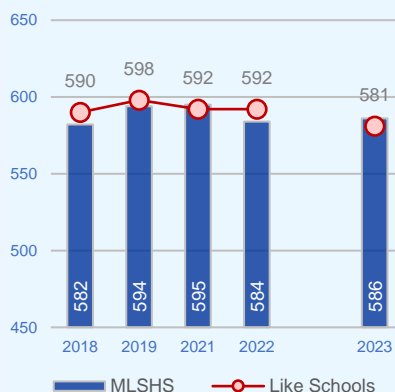

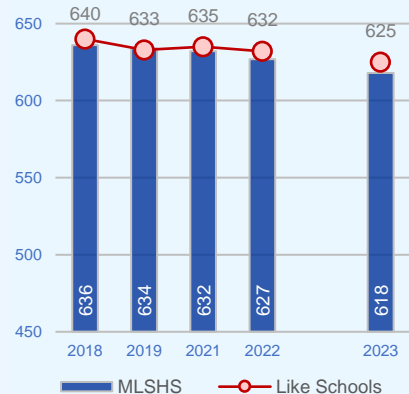

YEAR 7 NUMERACY



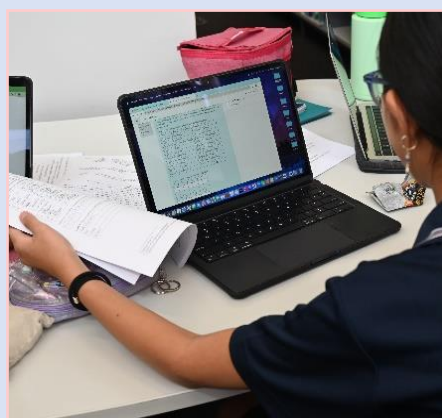

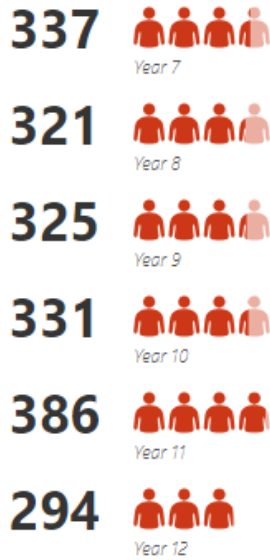




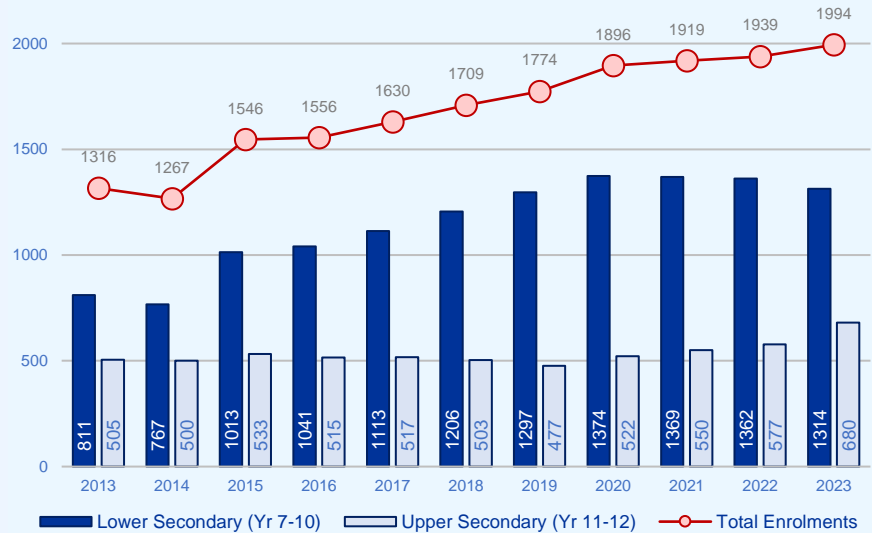
ENROLMENTS & ATTENDANCE

Total enrolments have increased steadily, from 2013 (1316) to 2023 (1969) represents a 49.6% percent increase over that period of time. To cater for this increase in student numbers, a significant capital works project to construct a 20-classroom block commenced in 2023. Completion is expected towards the end of semester 1 during 2024.

ENROLMENTS BY YEAR LEVEL: 2023

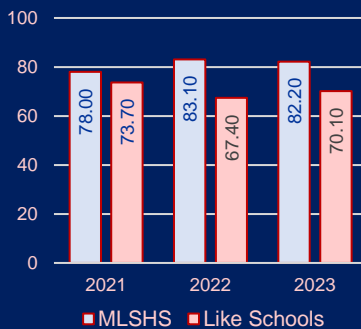


GRAPH SHOWING STUDENT ENROLMENTS 2013 - 2023

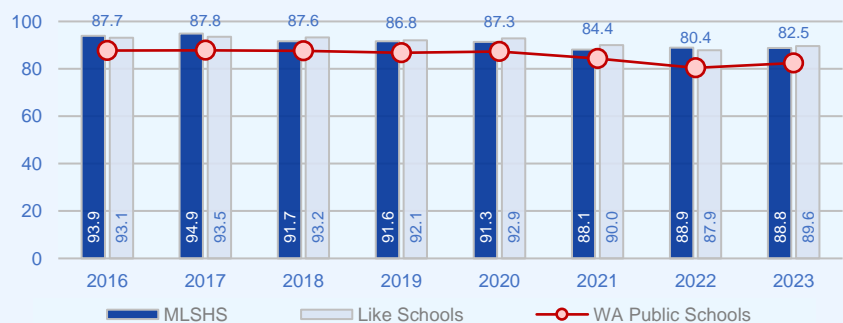

During the period 2018 – 2023, the Attendance Rate of Aboriginal students has significantly exceeded the Attendance Rate of Aboriginal students at Like Schools.

During the period 2016 – 2023 the Attendance Rate has been + or – 1.5% when compared with Like Schools.

Mount Lawley SHS attendance for 2023 was 0.8% lower than “like” schools and well within the Attendance Rate expected for band 1 schools.

Aboriginal student attendance at Mount Lawley SHS (82.2) remains significantly higher than at like schools (70.1) and WA public schools (59.2).



GIFTED & TALENTED (GAT) - LANGUAGES

Entry to THE GAT program is via testing and placement conducted by the Department of Education. In order to maintain the program, schools with GAT programs are required to report on the level of academic achievement by students within this group. To this end, ATAR scores are examined below for the Year 12 (2022) graduating cohort as well as the NAPLAN scores for these students when they were in Year 9 (2020) and Year 7 (2018).

Discussion Points	<p>The National School Opinion Surveys are an important source of information, assisting the school in self-reflection and improvement planning. The results are presented to, and discussed with, the school's Executive Team and the School Board as a part of this process.</p> <p>The lowest scoring item (student behaviour – 2.8) is subject to ongoing and formal program/resourcing reviews in order to meet the increasingly complex needs of our students. In 2023 this included: Ongoing, regular SAER meetings, increased school psychologist time, engagement program, by referral, for disengaged students, North Metropolitan Education Region funding of engagement program for “At Risk”, Year 10 students. This focus will continue in 2024.</p>						



VOCATIONAL EDUCATION & TRAINING (VET)

Our Vocational Education and Training program (VET) enhances the students' learning by offering an industry recognised qualification and increasing their employability skills. Students commence their qualifications in Year 11 and generally complete them in Year 12. Most courses require two-years for successful completion.

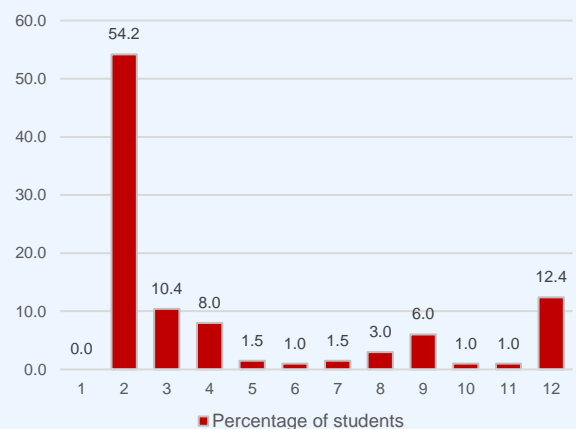
Students who complete VET programs can use their qualification to gain part-time and, in some cases, full-time employment as well as enrol in higher level qualifications at TAFE. The higher-level qualifications can lead to employment and can also be used as a pathway to university. A student is enrolled in an Authority Developed Workplace Learning (ADWPL) class if they are engaged in Work Experience in Year 11 & 12. For every 55 hours of verified ADWPL work placement completed, along with the addition of a "Skills Journal", that student is awarded an endorsed unit equivalent to a C grade.

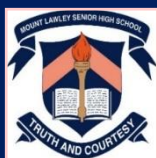

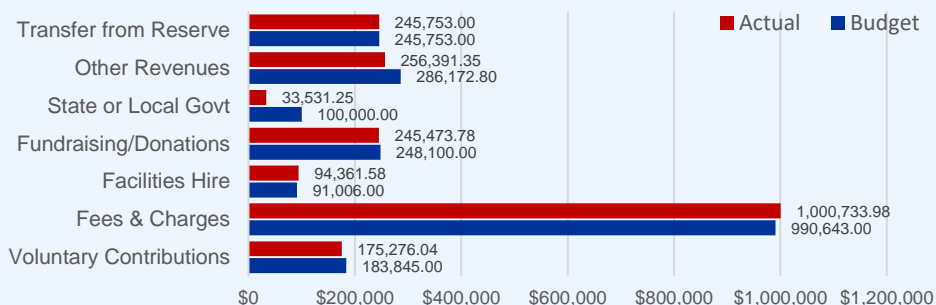

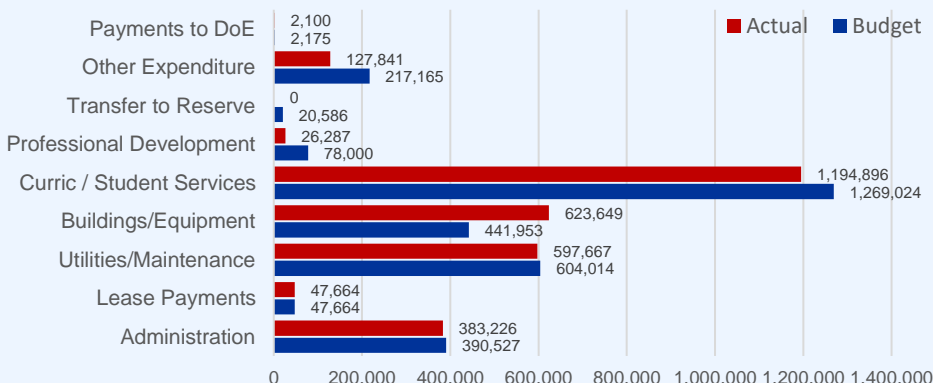

- * Consolidated new partnership with Inglewood Bowls club. Embedded into Year 11 GEPES program.
- * Evaluated and re-programmed GTPES to reflect SCSA trend with less assessment tasks and to deliver in sequential units to aid in EST content delivery.
- * OneNote and Teams being implemented across the department to aid in curriculum delivery and remote learning.
- * Staff worked collaboratively developing new, flexible PE program in anticipation of new building program at the school, impacting on facility availability.
- * New Bus acquired to access more external providers.
- * Court redevelopment to provide more functional space for HPE classes.

LANGUAGES LEARNING AREA

- * Languages and Arts Festival – promotion of Languages to the school community where cultures come alive. A large active display of cultural cuisine, sport, art, music, traditions and customs where students participate in cultural workshops and are immersed in many cultural displays.
- * Languages Week – students participate in a range of culturally stimulating activities to promote and support Language learning.
- * Korean – Teacher for a Day, K-pop dance, made and sampled Korean cuisine, students represented the school at the Perth Korean War Memorial Service, Australia-Korean Schools Education Online Symposium, Korean Day Curtin Event with and Korean scholarships to promote Korean Language Learning. Korean Teachers' Association – KOLTAWA, the Korean government and Curtin University worked collaboratively with MLSHS to support the Korean Language program at the school.

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LANGUAGES LEARNING AREA

* Japanese – Japanese Club offered at lunchtime in Term 4 where students participated in an array of Japanese cultural activities including Wagashi, Sadou, Cherry Blossom Season, Make Your Mascot and Japanese Picnic. Furthermore, throughout the year students made onigiri; Japanese rice balls, sampled various noodles, sushi, made and sampled kaki-gori (shaved ice desserts) and hosted Japanese exchange students. Japanese scholarships were awarded to promote Japanese language learning from Gold Education Tours. Japanese teacher, Clare Martis was the state recipient of the Sangora Award – a monetary award towards an in-country stays and Japanese resources. Japanese Teachers' Association – JLTAWA and Gold Education Tours worked collaboratively with MLSHS to support the Japanese program at the school.

* French – French Film Festival excursion, restaurant outing, pen pals with a French school, French cooking and French Language Assistant who supported student learning. Select students in Year 10 French completed the Alliance Française Exam. Jakob Collins was placed amongst the top five students in Western Australia for this exam. Réunion Island French Exchange Programme (hosting and in-country homestay with a French family). Year 10 UWA French excursion to promote the language delivered by French lecturers and university students. UWA, Alliance Française and the French Teachers' Association - TOFA worked collaboratively with MLSHS to support the French program at the school.

* Chinese – moon cake making, played Chinese hacky sack called Jianzi, tried on Chinese traditional dress; Hanfu, sampled Chinese cuisine, Chinese pen pals with a Chinese school, and Chinese Language Assistant who supported student learning. William Tucker Memorial plaque service. William Tucker Memorial Fund Award for a Year 11 student was introduced and supported by Susan Tucker. Select students sat the Chinese Proficiency test to determine their official level in the language. The Chinese Teachers' Association – CLTAWA worked collaboratively with the school to support the Chinese teaching program.

* Italian – Italian Film Festival excursion, pen pals with an Italian school, bocce, sampling and cooking Italian food, Italy Tour 2024 approval, WAATI/AFS Italian Exchange Program promotion aimed at Year 11 Italian students (MLSHS student hosts an Italian student for two months and in return the MLSHS student has a two month in-country stay attending an Italian school and resides with an Italian family), and Italian Language Assistant who supported student learning. Year 10 UWA Italian Language excursion with Italian lecturers and university students to promote the language. The Italian Teachers' Association – WAATI and UWA work collaboratively with the school to support the Italian teaching program.

* Language awards – gift vouchers for top language students.

* GAT Club 1 (Italian and Chinese) – Guest speakers from UWA for Italian and Chinese and alumni student to talk to students about tertiary pathways for Languages.

* GAT Club 2 (Italian and Chinese) – Drones workshop by Aicode Australia.

* GAT Club 3 (Italian and Chinese) – competitive bocce and traditional Italian food at the Tuscany Association Bocce Club.

* GAT Club 4 (Italian and Chinese) – Italian restaurant where students communicated with staff in Italian and experienced authentic Italian culture and cuisine.

* GAT Induction Day (Year 6 GAT students) – parents and students are welcomed to the school. Made fresh pasta with Italian Chef Valentina and Chinese mooncakes.

* GAT Parent Information Evening – The GAT Parent Presentation Evening was at ECU conducted by the Department of Education Gifted and Talented Unit. The session included content and detailed the application, selection and placement process for entry to the Gifted and Talented Secondary Selective Entrance Program.

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LANGUAGES LEARNING AREA

- * The year 10 GAT Language students participated in the Farewell Ceremony and Breakfast which congratulated students on completing the 4-year course.
- * GAT competition – Year 7 - 10 students participated in the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO). Students worked collaboratively to unlock patterns in real languages.
- * The GAT Parent Committee Meeting held regular meetings each term to fundraise and support the GAT Community at Mount Lawley Senior High School.
- * GAT language awards – gift vouchers from the GAT Parent Committee.
- * The Department's GAT Unit and MLSHS worked collaboratively to deliver a successful GAT Languages Program.



MATHEMATICS LEARNING AREA

Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC)

304 students across Years 7 to 12 participated in the AMC. Although we did not have any students obtain High Distinctions, a total of 71 students scored Distinctions. 71% of these Distinctions were achieved by our students from Years 7 to 10.

Have Sum Fun Mathematics Competition

This event gained more popularity in the second year we have offered it to students at Mount Lawley. The number of teams we sent to participate in this competition has doubled. Two teams of twelve students from the Year 7/8 GAT AE classes went to Trinity College to be represented in the Central Metro division. Another two teams of twelve students from the Year 9/10 AE classes went to Bob Hawke College (Central Metro division).

Australasian Problem-Solving Mathematical Olympiad

We continued to offer this opportunity to our Year 7 GAT/AE students

Maths Enrichment workshop conducted by World of Maths

In 2022, we organised a Maths Enrichment workshop for the whole cohort of Year 8 students held at the end of the year. Based on our observations, we noticed that the workshop highly engaged the interest of our Year 8 GAT/AE students. Hence in 2023, we offered the same Maths Enrichment workshop to our Year 7 and 8 GAT/AE students. Latiefa Adams who is the teacher in charge of the Year 7 and 8 GAT/AE Maths classes initiated a proposal to invite Year 5 students from our feeder primary schools to also participate in this workshop. Through our networks with our feeder primary schools, we hosted a total of 26 Year 5 students. They mingled with our Year 7 and 8 GAT/AE students and ten of our Year 9 AE students played hosts to these young visitors. It was a very effective way for our school to build strategic relationships with our community in hope that these young bright minds would consider choosing Mount Lawley SHS as their first choice of secondary school.



TECHNOLOGIES LEARNING AREA

- * All Year 9 and 10 Computing classes were in classrooms in the STEM building.
- * Subject Selection Talks presented to Year 10s in the lead up to their selections for Year 11 courses. The focus for our Technologies Learning Area being the whole notion of employer demand for STEM skills and qualifications being high and that this demand will only increase in the future. Our courses provide students with the opportunities to achieve these highly sought-after key STEM skills.
- * The Technologies Learning Area experienced a continued positive increase in the number of students in D&T and Home Economics choosing a wide variety of Technologies elective courses that we have on offer.

- * The Spike Prime Lego Robotic Kits continue to be well received by the Year 7 and 8 classes and their course structures and resources were centrally rationalised by experienced specialist teachers.
- * Competition table was made for year 9/10 digital technology (FFL first Lego League) classes located in the STEM room. Improved classroom engagement.
- * Extra-curricular activities in Technologies were offered to year 7 & 8 students. The "CAD club" the aim of which is to develop and expose students to CAD/CAM technologies.
- * Introduction of Dimensional Design in year 11 and 12.
- * Hospitality students showcased skills catered for High Achiever Breakfasts, Year 12 Leavers Lunch, Family Breakfast.
- * Workshop learning environment improvements, welding bays have been reconfigured to allow teachers to view students welding in real time, new Milling machine and Rollers were installed.
- * Replacement of 3D printers will enhance the learning experiences for Digital Technology and Design and Technology students.

Whole School Arts Highlights

* Languages and Arts Festival: Another successful Languages and Arts Festival was held in Week 9, Term One. This annual school event supported by the P&C offers a whole approach to the enjoyment of arts and cultural activities from 12:30-3:00pm.

Drama Highlights Term 1

* Year 11 Monologue Night: On 2nd March at Tricycle Theatre, the Year 11 Drama students presented the "Year 11 Monologue Night." This event showcased their exploration of Konstantin Stanislavski's techniques, which aim to turn actors into psychologically rounded characters. The performance was a free event, and students worked diligently to make it a memorable experience for the audience.

Drama Highlights Term 3

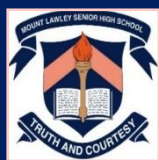
Tech and Dress Rehearsal, "A Midsummer Night's Dream Boat"

Production of both the performance and film has been guided by a team of supportive Noongar Elders"

* A Mid-Summer Night's Dream: The Year 8 production was another successful event supported by the Creative Industries students.

* Yr 9 Excursion to the Cultural Centre: Students participated in a cultural excursion to the city where they viewed works from PICA, The Art Gallery of WA and Boola Bardip gaining appreciation for the variety and range of Arts available for viewing in the Perth Cultural Centre.

* Year 7 Awesome Festival (21st September): Year 7 SVAPA students participated in the 2023 AWESOME International Arts Festival at the State Theatre Centre. They enjoyed a performance of "Dr AudiYo's Giant Adventure," which blended old-school clowning and beatboxing. The show invited the audience to become heroes, working with Dr AudiYo to save the day. AWESOME aims to inspire creativity and expression in young Western Australians through various contemporary art forms.

* SVAPA Weekend Workshop: This weekend workshop involved SVAPA students and focused on various aspects of the arts.

* SVAPA Camp (5th - 7th November): The SVAPA Camp allowed Year 7 SVAPA students to work with the Year 8 SVAPA class in the four art forms of Drama, Media, Music, and Visual Art. * Music Camp: The annual Music camp was held at Woodman Point and involved students in Concert Band 1, Senior Strings Orchestra, Classical Guitar Ensemble 1, Big Band 1 and the Contemporary Ensemble 1

* Jazz Gig at Fremantle Jazz Club: A jazz gig took place at the Fremantle Jazz Club, featuring Year 12 student Louis Rebeiro alongside Music teacher Dijon Summers. The public performance included Mount Lawley Senior High School alumni and highlighted the school's commitment to supporting its students' musical endeavours.
